## What is the Amendment? Depends on who you ask...

If you approve this amendment, *the state portion of the sales tax on food will be removed* , and *enhanced funding for education will be constitutionally guaranteed* .

By voting YES on Amendment A, you are deciding to:

- *Remove state sales tax on food* to help ease the financial strain on Utahns and support families.
- *Constitutionally guarantee a rainy -day education fund* to support education during economic downturns.
- Immediately *boost per-pupil spending by about \$85 million* .
- *Prioritize funding for student enrollment changes* and long-term inflation.
- *Protect the education budget* even if student enrollment decreases over the next five years.

Amendment A is an A+ for education, an A+ for Utah families, and an A+ for our state. Join us in voting YES on Amendment A for a better, brighter, and more prosperous Utah!

## What will voters see on their ballot?

### Amendment A

Shall the Utah Constitution be amended to allow income tax money to be used for all state needs and prioritize public education funding for changes in enrollment and inflation?

If this amendment is approved, state statute will eliminate the state sales tax on food.

**Q:** Amendment A is worded like it will increase public school funding—is that right?

**A:** That is wrong. Amendment A was carefully crafted by state politicians to mask its true intent—a power grab to take money away from Utah’s public schools and give it to vouchers for private religious schools. **Utah’s Constitution already protects public school funding—Amendment A would weaken those protections.**

**Q:** It looks like Amendment A would cut the tax on food.
